ver the past several years, I've found that the month of September brings with it the same sort of internal stirrings that March does. A sense of anticipation for something still unarticulated. The New MOS Mentor-Protégé Program by

n important aspect of encouraging new and recently-joined MOS members to continue growing orchids is helping them successfully grow and bloom their orchids. Our Beginner's Corner is a key part of helping newer orchid growers. We hope that an Orchid Growing Mentor-Protégé Program will be another way to help new and existing members, and ensure their long-term success with orchid growing.

The main elements of the MOS Mentor-Protégé Program will be:

- Experienced MOS orchid growers who will serve as mentors
- New, recently-joined, and less experienced current MOS members who want to participate as protégés in a mentoring program
- An organized process to help protégés meet and select a mentor suitable to their needs, and with whom they feel comfortable
- An array of potential learning activities for protégés with the mentor they have selected
- A mutually agreed upon duration of the mentor-protégé relationship
- A few simple rules to define the mentor-protégé relationship, to ensure a comfort level for all participants

So – what exactly are the benefits to a protégé of participating in this Program? Here are some potential learning activities for protégés that could be arranged with a mentor:

- Call or e-mail the mentor for advice, or help with an orchid culture problem, such as pests, bud drop, leaves yellowing or burned, or selection of pots, media, or orchids, etc.
- Visit the mentor's orchid collection see the mentor's growing conditions, orchid specialties, and culture techniques; share cuttings
- Invite your mentor to visit your orchid collection – discuss which orchids are growing the best, the overall health of your orchids, possible changes in your growing conditions, controlling pests and diseases, sources of equipment, fertilizers, pesticides, virus control

- View orchids on the MOS show table together with your mentor, and discuss their merits, rarity, and/or culture challenges
- Visit an orchid show or meeting at another orchid society with your mentor
- Visit an orchid vendor together to buy orchids.

The Ad Hoc Mentor-Protégé Committee (Bill Ellis, Ann Lundy, and David Smith) has been recruiting volunteer mentors, based on their success in growing orchids, and regular attendance at MOS monthly meetings. Mentors who have volunteered so far include:

- Rachael and Steve Adams
- Bill Ellis
- Bill Scharf
- David Smith
- Eric Wiles

So far, we have two MOS members who would like to try out the Program as protégés. We hope other members will give it a try.

If you think you might be interested in connecting with a mentor for a while (we suggest an agreement of about 6 months to start), here are some suggested criteria for picking a mentor:

- Someone who lives near your home
- Someone you feel comfortable with, after meeting them at a meeting
- Someone who grows their orchids under conditions similar to yours: windowsill, lights, greenhouse, etc.
- Someone who likes similar orchids: hybrids, species, Cattleya alliance, Phalaenopsis, Lady Slippers, etc.

The committee will be providing a written list of mentors, with their interest and growing styles. We plan to place a colored sticker on the MOS name badges of mentors – the colors are yet to be chosen, but one color will mean "I'm available" and another color will mean "Not currently available - ask about my waiting list." Mentors may decline a request if they believe that there are strong differences,

such as in orchid interests or in physical locations.

Some useful rules to agree upon, or modify to suit, with your mentor:

- No phone calls after 9 PM Sunday through Thursday
- No phone calls before 9 AM
- No visits to home of mentor or protégé without prior agreement

We are expecting to get a few more mentors to volunteer. Let Bill Ellis know if you are interested in being a mentor or a protégé. He can be reached at:

Changes to the MOS Monthly Auction

he monthly orchid auction is a vital part of the MOS spectrum of member services. It gives members the chance to acquire species and hybrids often unavailable commercially yet grown in our local environment. Additionally, it contributes positively to the organization's bottom line. (The annual profits from the auctions are roughly equivalent to 30 annual membership dues.)

However because of its burgeoning popularity, the auction contributes to the meeting running a bit long into the night. In May and June 2009, we started experimenting with ways to decrease the time required to hold the auction. We are continuing the experiment in September by holding a silent auction for excess plants.

- When at least 15 lots are received for auction, the first 10 lots will be sold via our regular interactive auction.
- All lots received after the first 10 will be sold via a silent auction.
- Silent auction lots will be open for bidding until the beginning of the meeting. At that time, bidding will be closed. The winning bidder for each lot will be announced at the end of the meeting.

From the Ashes, a Rare Beauty Emerges

The managers of Maryland's largest private nature preserve burned 240 acres this spring in the hopes of triggering the growth of long-dormant native plants. The plan worked, producing a rare hybrid orchid that has only been found in Maryland once before — 18 years ago.

Botanist Ron Wilson made the dazzling find in late July at the Nassawango Creek Preserve on the Eastern Shore, where the charred woodlands and prairies have responded with the appearance of rare native plants.

He found three specimens of a naturally occurring hybrid of the white fringed orchid and the crested yellow orchid. These species are uncommon enough, but the hybrid has only been found in Maryland once before — by Wilson and another botanist almost two decades ago at another Maryland site. It is known by its botanic name, Platanthera x *canbyi*.

"It's hard to explain to a non-botanist, but you go to site after site that has literally nothing as far as rare plants go, and find something like this," Wilson said. "It makes it all worth it." From ground-hugging, straplike leaves, the hybrid sends up a 12-inch flowering stalk in summer, but the blooms are lemon

yellow in contrast to the white flowers of the white fringed orchid and the orange blooms of the crested yellow.

The controlled fires were set between March and May with the help of a \$55,000 federal grant and represented the largest annual burns to date at the 10,000-acre preserve, said Deborah Landau, conservation ecologist for the Nature Conservancy's Maryland/D.C. chapter.

The fires eradicate unwanted trees, shrubs and weeds; add nitrogen to the soil; and trigger responses from plants that evolved to grow after natural wildfires.

Wilson surveyed the areas last year and found seven white fringed orchids and no crested yellow orchids. This year, in addition to the appearance of the hybrid, Wilson found more than 50 white fringed and more than 20

crested yellow orchids. The fires have also encouraged the appearance of other rare plants, including sedges and grasses.

"To see such a dramatic change so quickly after the fire is a vindication, to see things that haven't been seen essentially in 70 years," Landau said.
