The Judges Choice of the Evening was Den. *spectabile* 'Tickle' CCM/AOS, exhibited by Jos Venturina. (See below for how Jos grows his 'Tickle'.) The judges were Rob Griesbach, Janice Mazur and Barbara Buck. There were an incredible 153 beautiful plants displayed on our show table this month!

january 2012 judges' choice

endrobium *spectabile*, a species endemic in New Guinea, has unusual, long-lasting, honey-scented flowers. It is relatively easy to grow.

We bought our plant in 2009 from Waldor Orchids when they had an Open House sale. At that time, the plant was not in bloom and had eight mature canes and at least five old growths. It was not in the best of shape when we purchased it, but looked healthy enough. The plant originally came from Tropical Orchid Farm (TOF).

This plant was originally potted in sphagnum moss and since I have had no luck using sphagnum moss in my current greenhouse conditions, I replaced it with well-draining fir bark as soon as I got it home. Generally, I only use sphagnum

moss on mounted plants, not in potted plants. In addition to changing the media, I also cut away some of the old, central canes to create space for new growths there. Since then, the plant took off. It spent the past two summers outside the greenhouse, under aluminum shade cloth, to get 50% sunlight. It stayed outside from May through October. I watered it daily

and fertilized heavily using manure tea (yes, animal manure) and Better-Gro High-Nitrogen orchid fertilizer. The plant multiplied like weeds, grew taller and wider, attaining its present size in a short period of time.

Before the winter weather set in, I moved this plant back to the greenhouse, reduced watering and stopped the fertilizer. Once the nighttime greenhouse temperature goes down to 55 degrees, this plant, along with my other dendrobiums, initiates flower spikes. It is at this point that grooming is best done. Grooming the plant by pruning, staking and cleaning optimizes presentation, with the final product ready for display.

Joan Roderick placed this beautiful Paph. venustum on the show table in December. I asked her how she grew her plant so successfully.

ve always loved *venustum* for the pattern, color and texture of the flower. I grow it in my foyer on the bottom shelf of an old wooden tea cart. On the bottom of the top shelf I installed an LED light used as under counter illumination in kitchens. I keep my Paphs there until the spike is pretty tall and the

bud is full. I then put them on a shelf (still in the foyer) and place a goose neck floor lamp (cheap from Ikea) with a cfl 75w, in front of them so the flower opens face forward. Water when almost dry. I bought this one a Parkside Orchids.

# **SARAH SPENCE:**

Cultivating Greenhouse Beauty and Classroom Confidence

Visitors to the BCCC greenhouse, high atop the Liberty Campus Life Sciences Building, may find themselves suddenly craving a candy bar. That's because whenever a certain orchid on the premises is in bloom, it smells exactly like chocolate! In fact, that very plant, known as the Oncidium 'Sharry Baby' orchid, won second place in the fragrance category of a local orchid competition. Sarah Spence, BCCC professor of natural and physical sciences, entered the specimen and brought

Since then, the good professor has made quite a habit of winning awards in MOS competitions. She won the society's best first-time hobbyist award in 2008 and its best interpretation of show theme award in 2011, along with first, second and third place ribbons for specific plants. Sarah's prize record is all the more impressive considering her interest in orchids began just eight

# My reward is seeing them blossom, grow and thrive.

Maryland State Fairgrounds and just happened upon the orchid exhibit and competition," she explains, "and the plants were amazing!" Shortly after, a friend who was moving to a smaller place asked the professor to adopt her orchids, all 18 of them! Sarah took them in and is now nurturing 62 orchids in her home, proving—as she points out—that growing orchids is not "just the hobby of the rich and famous."

The professor further observes that orchids are not nearly as exotic as most people think. "In fact, they're the most prolific plant on the planet, growing in almost every climate, including Maryland's. The most common variety here is called the Lady Slipper." Nor are orchids as difficult to care for as is widely believed, she says. "It just takes patience, and don't over-water them," she advises. "You don't want to expose them to too much

heat from direct sunlight. Just feel their leaves, and if they're too warm, move the plant. It might also help to have a little fan nearby to keep the air moving."

Sarah is now an active member (and secretary) of the Maryland Orchid Society, exchanging plants with fellow members and engaging in the organization's monthly competitions. She is proudest of her most recent award from last year's annual competition, the one for best interpretation of show theme. Her winning entry for the theme of Orchids: a Symphony of Color was a display consisting of nine plants artfully arranged with sheet music and a conductor's baton.

It's no surprise that this passion for orchids finds its way into Sarah's classroom and lab, where she sometimes uses her plants to heighten student interest in science research. That's not the only connection she finds between teaching students and growing orchids. "In both cases, I have to apply my knowledge of science and give plenty of attention and care, especially to the ones that are struggling. My reward is seeing them blossom, grow and thrive."

# A Year in the Life by Chip Hiebler

I've had a love of orchids since I was young, always admiring them from a distance, never thinking I could raise them without a greenhouse. That all changed in May 2010, when for my 28th wedding anniversary I gave my wife Cathy a gift of Calvin Klein "Euphoria" that included a mail in certificate for an orchid. (Orchids are the traditional gift for the 28th anniversary) My Phalaenopsis arrived in bloom and I cared for it as most novices do; with absolutely no skills, abilities or knowledge of what I was doing.

Fast forward to March 2011 when I first heard of MOS. Cathy read about the annual orchid show and asked if I wanted to go, to which I emphatically answered "yes!" We entered the hall and were overwhelmed with the displays and the magnitude of the orchids on display and on sale. I was like the veritable kid in a candy store. As we were walking around admiring the various displays we heard an announcement that there would be a lecture on the basics of growing orchids in 15 minutes. We made our way to the lecture area where we were introduced to Dr. Clark Riley. I was admittedly intimidated at first when Clark told us of his extensive orchid collection and the dedicated growing area in his house complete with lighting and drainage systems. However, Clark assured and convinced me that I could grow orchids with no practical experience, at home under normal conditions using tap water. Having heard that, it was just a short, wide-eyed walk over to the vendor area where I immediately increased my orchid collection with a Psychopsis and a Brassia. At the time, I didn't know, but the gentleman that collected my money was Bill Scharf. He invited us to consider joining the Maryland Orchid Society and sent us over to meet Sue Spicer who signed us up without hesitation after a short but effective and convincing sales pitch.

I am definitely not a joiner, don't normally participate in clubs and organizations, and didn't expect much when I attended my



first MOS meeting. What I found was not a group of orchid enthusiasts, but a group of orchid experts! I was amazed by the contents of the show table, the lecture on finding rare and exotic orchids on Ebay by Clark Riley and the friendliness of the members, like Marilyn Lauffer who welcomed us openly. That meeting was followed by our attending the Spring repotting event, where I found out about pests from Sarah Hurdel, learned about Jewel Orchids from Valerie Lowe, found out that a blowtorch is a necessary tool to growing orchids from David Smith and learned that the decorative clay pot and soil I had transferred that first Phalaenopsis into was eventually going to kill it.

Since those first events, I have become an active member of MOS and my lonely Phalaenopsis is now surrounded by eighteen or so companions of various varieties that share the sunroom we recently added on the back of our house. We even went so far as to have the contractor build extra wide windowsills to accommodate my growing collection. We've attended and enjoyed the monthly meetings, participated in and won awards on the show table, attended another reporting event led by Dr. Eric Wiles at David and Margaret Smith's home and discovered The Little Greenhouse at Tom

McBride and Gary Krause's open house. I think it's fair to say I've completely joined MOS and that it was one of the smartest things I've done recently.

After a year of my new found addiction to orchids, one thing continues to amaze and impress me. I have never met or been associated with a group of people that have such a broad range of expertise and are so willing to freely share it at a moment's notice. The past twelve months have been a gratifying time and truly a learning experience for me, and I look forward to many more years of association with MOS. My sincerest thanks goes out to all of the members for sharing your vast knowledge, your genuine friendship and for giving so generously of yourselves. You have truly made this a rewarding and memorable year in the life of this orchid enthusiast.
