June's Guest Speaker


One of our own MOS members will be presenting in June 2021.

Arne Schon started growing orchids in Sweden over 40 years ago but could not really continue during the 1990s because of studies, work, and a lot of international traveling.

After a brief period in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Arne and his wife moved from Sweden to Baltimore in 2001, where Arne holds a position as research scientist at Johns Hopkins University. Arne started growing orchids more seriously again in 2007.

With the exception of a single small window, Arne grows his orchid collection under lights in his basement. He has chosen to grow many of the orchids mounted on bark or wood mostly because many orchids are easily cared for when they are mounted but also for aesthetic reasons.

Arne brought his first orchid for AOS judging in 2014 and has received six awards since then. Arne's wife, Khairul Bariah, has been writing about his orchid collection in her blog since 2014 (http://arnesorchidcorner.blogspot.com/).

Orchids at the Maryland State Fair

22 August – 6 September 2021

As COVID risks are decreasing, the Maryland State Fair has recently committed to moving forward with their annual end-of-summer festivities. The Maryland Orchid Society will similarly return to sponsoring an orchid 'show' and provide local (not AOS) judging of the entries. Entrants will be asked to self-identify as NOVICE or EXPERIENCED (presumably MOS members will fit here) and enter their orchids in the appropriate class: Phalaenopsis, Cattleya alliance, slippers (mostly Paphiopedilum or Phragmipedium), Dendrobium (a new class this year), or Others.

Entries will be housed in the same location as in past years with air conditioning, security monitoring, and periodic watering. Note, however, that orchids will be on display from 22 or 23 August (set-up) through the end of the Fair following the Labor Day weekend (6 September). Plan your entries accordingly.

This is likely to be our first MOS 'out-in-public' event since COVID effectively shut us down in March 2020, right after our annual show and sale. Please plan to take advantage of this opportunity with any of your summer-booming plants. Additional announcements and instructions will be provided, as we get closer to the dates. Please pass the word to any of your non-MOS friends who might have orchids to enter. Best in Show NOVICE orchid will earn a year's free membership in the MOS.

Spotlight on Orchid Research



A few highlights from one of the most recently awarded Research grants by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation from the Research Committee

"Comparative analysis of terrestrial orchid seeds to inform ex-situ conservation in Europe." Sara Magrini, PhD - Tuscia Germplasm Bank, Tuscia University (Viterbo, Italy)

The ex-situ conservation of orchid seeds in seed banks is potentially a cost-effective tool to provide a long-term extinction-proof backup of the genetic diversity of these species. However, seed-banking is not widely used for orchid conservation, yet, probably due to the evidence emerging that the seeds might have a shorter than expected lifespan under conventional seed bank conditions (dry storage at -20° C). The causes of such accelerated viability loss in orchid seeds remain unknown and is a key outstanding question in orchid conservation biology that needs answering.

An association between lipid crystallization and poor storage at subzero temperatures has been suggested for seeds and fern spores. One of the best means of determining such risks is thermal analysis. Differential scanning calorimetry (DSC)

can be used to rapidly characterize the physical properties of seeds at different temperatures (often down to -100° C). DSC, therefore, has the potential as a high-throughput, non-invasive tool to observe lipid phase transitions and understand variability in storage performance of seeds stored in seed banks (Hamilton et al. 2009)

A complete study of European orchid seeds' behaviour during low-temperature storage in seedbanks is needed to understand the poor storage performance of some species and to inform optimized ex-situ conservation options for these species.

The research idea arises from this need and involves two seedbanks:

The Tuscia Germplasm Bank (TGB) at Tuscia University, Viterbo (Italy), one of the very few European facilities devoted to ex-situ conservation of orchid seeds and the Royal Botanic Gardens Kew (UK), home to the Millennium Seed Bank (MSB), the largest seedbank worldwide.

The objectives of this project are:

- 1. To define the storage performance of seeds of the European orchid genera through viability assessment and longevity studies
- 2. To characterize biophysically the crystallization/melting patterns of orchid seeds by thermal profiling in DSC results
- 3. To investigate the relationship of poor storage performance (1 above) of orchid seeds stored dry at -20° C with their lipid crystallization and melting dynamics (2 above) through thermal analysis using Differential Scanning Calorimetry (DSC).
- 4. To predict the optimal storage temperatures for long term storage of orchid seeds, likely by avoiding freezing damage promoted by lipid crystallization and melting.


