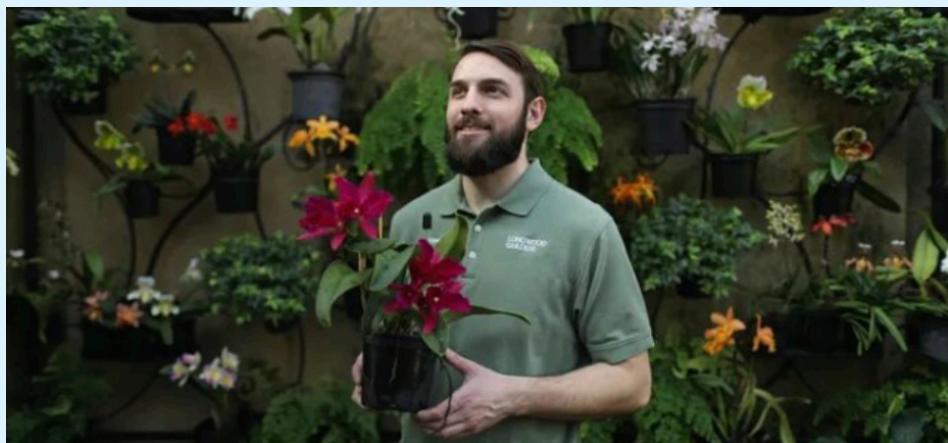
As always One last time: stay safe and healthy, grow beautiful orchids, and share them with us.

So Soon After Mothers' Day ...

It's been 'common knowledge' for a long time that fungal symbiosis can be a critical factor in nurturing newly germinated 'dust seeds' of many orchids. What is just now coming to light, however, is the role played by the parent (mother) orchids in that support role. A recent study from Great Britain (<https://phys.org/news/2024-05-orchid-nurture-seedlings-underground-fungal.html>) expands our understanding of that symbiotic network. Apparently, at least for the U.K.'s Common Spotted Orchid (*Dactylorhiza fuchsii*), it's not just the fungi providing the nutrition to the young protocorms. Adult plants were documented passing along newly produced organic material (food) to the fungal network for delivery to the young orchids.

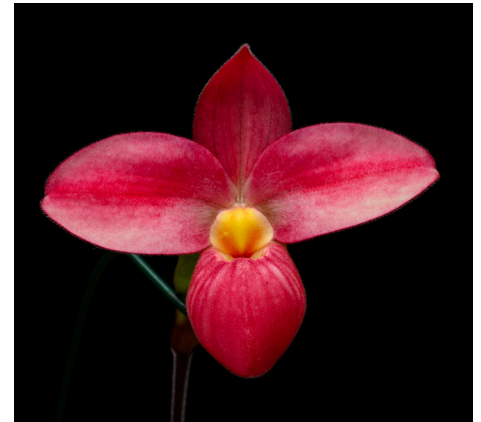

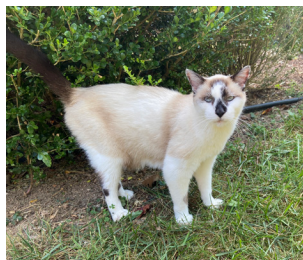

Help needed: Call for helpers for Summer 2024 MOS Shed Repair



The above picture on the left is from the January 2010 MOS Newsletter the last time the Shed had some tender loving care, the pictures on the right are today's condition. The shed is located at 12940 Triadelphia Mill Road, Clarksville, Md. 21029. The shed is used for storage of MOS Show, Auction, Away Show and past events supplies. We are grateful to Danny Adams, a MOS Life Member, for providing us with the space for our shed free of charge for probably 20 years.

On May 3rd John Heinbokel, Bob and Susan Travers, and Marc Kiriou met at the shed to evaluate the shed condition. We determined there are necessary repairs to be accomplished this summer and are calling for volunteers to help. At this time, we don't have a date but if you would like to participate, please text Bob Travers 410-336-3873 and you will be added to the will call list as we set a date. Most likely we will schedule for weekend work. There may be a call for a mid-week materials delivery, we will have to move materials into the shed before work begins.

What's the work?

The left side of the shed has some lower T1-11 panel rot issues, as does the back wall. These will be repaneled. The front wall with the double doors needs reframing and squaring. The right wall is in good shape and needs preparation for repainting. The whole shed will need repainting. The roof needs to be replaced and the replacement of one water damaged decking panel. The window in the back needs reframing. The good news is the floor is in good condition.

Skills needed; Basic home owner maintenance skills, Hammering, Measuring, Sawing, Sanding, Painting, Group Lifting, Clean up after, Enjoy group participation.

Tools needed; There is electricity available. If you have some electric or battery powered tools that may be useful, please include them in your text to Bob. Does anyone have a roofing shingle ripping tool? Personal hand tools are welcome, just label them so they go home with you. Tools: Paint Brushes/Rollers/Pans/Scrapers/ ladders (6')/ Hammers/Screw Drivers/ Sawhorses/nail gun/staple gun/ radial saw/ tape measure/pencils/paper/squares/tarps/ trash haul away/shingle remover tool/ nail clean up magnet/easy up for shade/folding chairs, water, food, Trash Haul Away Plan.

Cost: We are still pricing materials; however, we are anticipating about \$1500. This Shed Maintenance is an unbudgeted activity for the Society, and we will accept Directed Donations to help offset this expense. Donations to the Maryland Orchid Society are Tax Deductible.

How do these pictures relate to your orchid summertime?



The first picture is David Smith demonstrating repotting an orchid at one of our spring workshops. Many of us are repotting our orchids in earnest to beat the summer heat. Some plants will be potted up so they may grow to become beautiful specimens and future MOS and AOS award winners. Others are ready to be divided. The next two pictures are from a November MOS Annual Auction and are included to ask you to consider potting some divisions for donation to the **MOS Annual Auction Nov 16, 2024**. We welcome donations of plants that are named and those that have been awarded – these will raise the most money. NOIDs are also welcome. The annual auction is the primary revenue maker for funding our MOS activities, including the fundamentals of meeting hall donation, speaker fees, refreshments, promotion, etc. Your donations are tax deductible.

Oh, by the way, a few things to remember as you are repotting.

- Use clean or new pots.
- Use sterilized or single use cutting devices.
- Always put labels back in your plant's pot where the name is known. If you don't know the name, still make a label with the genera and color. Pre-make your labels if dividing so they are ready when you are done potting.
- Take and save digital photos of your plants in bloom and name the photo file with the plant name. This comes in handy when you lose a label. If the plant blooms this summer, you can submit the picture for the July or August Zoom meeting Virtual Show Table (VST). Sorry there are no exhibitor points in July and August VST. These pictures can be used to make picture labels for plants donated to the MOS auction. More on this in the fall.

Cooking Orchids in Your Car and Other Hazards of Summer

Though the public often pictures orchids as heat-loving plants, we know they often prefer the same pleasant temperatures we like — year round. As with us humans, summer conditions can be rough on orchids, even deadly.

Car transport: You've just picked up a beautiful box of orchids at your favorite orchid nursery or shop and are on your way home. But you need to stop at the grocery for just a couple of items. **DANGER!** The temperature of a closed car can soar to 150° F in a matter of minutes out in the sun. You may return to an ugly box of dead orchids. Put off that grocery trip or leave the car open and attended.

Sunshine: Your beautiful box is safely home and you know those Cattleyas and Catasetums enjoy bright light, so you check out the sun porch. **DANGER!** Cattleyas, Catasetums, and Habenarias do like bright light, even full sun, but they must adjust to the higher light, producing the leaf colors and structures to cope with the heavy light. Bring them out slowly, cover them with cheesecloth for a few weeks, and mist them frequently at first.

Outdoor violence: You were listening in the Maryland Orchid Society programs about how orchids thrive with a summer outdoors, so you've set up the deck for your plants. **DANGER!** Without some planning, your plants are at the mercy of the forces of nature. Heavy winds, thunderstorms, and marauding animals (dogs and cats, we're talking about *you!*) can knock the pots over, breaking the pots and the plants and exposing them to drying out. Have some barriers around your summering area and consider setting your plastic potted plants in terra cotta ("clay") pots for stability.

Summer is a great time for your plants if you take a few precautions. They'll bloom better and bigger after their summer vacation.

One plant quickly became twenty or so, and before long he was hooked. In 2010 he visited Parkside Orchid Nursery for the first time, and by Summer 2011 he was working part time for Tom Purviance and John Salventi. He studied under their tutelage while working for them, and when they sold the nursery in 2012, he was hired by the new owners as the Grower and Manager of Parkside Orchid Nursery. He managed Parkside for one year, before leaving to grow orchids in Hawaii.

In Hawaii he worked for Hilo Orchid Farm for more than a year, spending a large amount of time working with *Paphiopedilum*, as well as Intergeneric *Oncidiinae*, and *Miltoniopsis*. At the beginning of 2015, Greg began working as the orchid grower at Longwood Gardens.

Since his arrival at Longwood, the orchid collection has grown and changed significantly. He has been a part of

developing a collection of terrestrial orchids from across the globe, and has initiated a number of breeding programs. Among these are breeding lines in the *Habenariinae*, *Cattleya Alliance*, *Intergeneric Oncidiinae*, *Paphiopedilum*, *Masdevallia*, *Disa*, and more. The *Disa* program achieved its first successes with the registration of three new hybrids in 2021, *Disa Longwood Renaissance Horizon*, *Disa Longwood Dawning Ever New*, and *Disa Longwood Advancing Excellence*.

Greg continues to work on improving and expanding the collection, as well as networking with great growers and hybridizers across the country. He also has authored a number of written works, and has participated in a number of video interviews as well.

In an era of unprecedented growth, along with the opening of the Reimagined Orchid

House at Longwood, the future of the orchid collection is open wide and the possibilities for innovation are endless!

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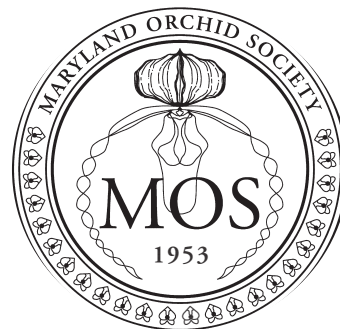
